


Our Lady of Good Counsel Church

Friends,

I wish that I could give this announcement face to face, however, this is the best I can do at the moment.

Bishop O'Connell has asked and I have accepted a reassignment to become Pastor at St. Gregory the Great Church in Hamilton Square, effective July 1, 2020, while still remaining the Director of the Office of Worship for the Diocese of Trenton. The possibility of a transfer is something I have been aware of for a few months, but without any certainty, however I was informed of the actual assignment in the middle/end of February. The official assignment letter was sent this week, which means it is no longer confidential. Also, the Monitor will have the list of new priest assignments for the diocese included in its issue to be published on Friday May 1, 2020.

I know that with any pastoral transfer there are a myriad of emotions and reactions. Please know that while this is not an assignment I have sought out, as I am very happy here at OLG, I did willingly accept it. I know it was one the bishop did not arrive at without significant consideration, and that he does not enjoy making major transfers if he can avoid it.

There are many things that have been in the works here at OLG, and many things that are unfinished, but I am confident that this parish is on strong footing for its future. I also know that in the midst of the current pandemic, it may seem like a very difficult time for a transition. Unfortunately, the moves this year were necessitated and put into motion prior to the current situation. There is a possibility that the current health crisis may delay the change, but that will only happen if and when it is necessary.

OLG will be receiving a new pastor, his name is Rev. Ariel Robles, and he is currently the Administrator of Saint James in Red Bank, whose pastor of almost 30 years died in December. Fr. Ariel is a wonderful and kind priest, who has done a yeoman's job of holding a very complicated parish together in the last few months. I am sure he is looking forward to coming to such a well-established, faith-filled and solid parish like this one (and perhaps less stressful).

Over the next two months, we will come together to discuss what is needed for a smooth transition, so that Fr. Ariel's entrance is as seamless as possible, while allowing the parish to continue moving forward. My biggest regret at this point, aside from knowing that I will miss this church greatly, is that I will not be present when the tremendously frustrating, but needed HVAC and Renovation project are finally completed, but I am very much looking forward to the finished product.

I want to thank you for all that you do and have done in accepting me as your pastor, and for being as faithful to this parish as you are. Know that I am still here for a couple of more months, which hopefully we will at least be able to spend part of together, and won't be far away when I go. While I am going "home" as a pastor, I will definitely always consider OLG to be home as well.

**The Perspective of Justice
Third Sunday of Easter

The Encounter

The two disciples are leaving Jerusalem. They had been
caught up in the experience of following Jesus, and they
were devastated by his crucifixion.

Moreover, they were undoubtedly frightened by the
prospect of what might happen to them as followers of the
executed master.

On their way from Jerusalem to Emmaus, they have an
unusual encounter.

The man they find themselves walking with seems to
understand much about the scriptures, but they aren't
able to make the connection between what he says and
who he is.

It is only in welcoming him into their house and sharing a
meal with him that they realize who it is they are facing:
it is Jesus, the risen Lord. So moved are they by the
encounter that they turn around and head back to
Jerusalem, to join up with the other disciples but also to
face risk and uncertainty.

They may very well have headed straight into martyrdom.

The Easter event can also turn around our lives. It can
cause us to “rise and come forth into the light of day,” but
we must be prepared for the risk and uncertainty such a
conversion would entail.

For the Church, evangelizing means bringing the good
news into all the strata of humanity, and through its
influence transforming humanity from within and making it
new. ...

*The purpose of evangelization is (an) interior change, and
if it has to be expressed in one sentence the best way to
stating it would be to say that the Church evangelizes
when she seeks to convert, solely through the divine
power of the message she proclaims, both the personal
and collective consciences of people, the activities in
which they engage, and the lives and concrete milieux
which are theirs.*
