WHY DO WE VEIL THE CRUCIFIX AND STATUES DURING LENT?

Veils over sacred images keep our minds on the promise of Easter.

First, The Church uses Veils to alert us of the special time that we are in. When we walk into church and notice everything is covered, we immediately know that something is different. These last two weeks of Lent are meant to be a time of immediate preparation for the Sacred Triduum and these veils are a forceful reminder to get ready.

Second, veils focus our attention on the words being said at Mass. When we listen to the Passion narrative, our senses are allowed to focus on the striking words from the Gospel and truly enter into the scene.

Third, the Church uses veils to produce a heightened sense of anticipation for Easter Sunday. This is further actualized when you attend daily Mass and see the veils each day. You don't want them to be there because they are hiding some very beautiful images.

And therein lies the whole point: the veils are not meant to be there forever. The images need to be unveiled; it is unnatural for them to be covered.

The unveiling before the Easter Vigil is a great reminder of our own life on earth. We live in a "veiled" world, in exile from our true home. It is only through our own death that the veil is lifted and we are finally able to see the beauty of everything in our lives.

This Lent Our Lady of Good Counsel will be veiling the Crucifix and Statues. How are you doing on your Lenten Journey?

Reflection 4TH Sunday of Lent

[Reading I: 2 Chronicles 36:14-16, 19-23](#)

“God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life.”

Torn from its context, this verse presents a heart-warming thought. The fuller literary context, as reported in today’s reading, darkens the picture: “people loved darkness rather than light”. For John, the term “world” carries a negative meaning. The world is at odds with Jesus and with his Spirit. Worse, it hates Jesus and those who believe in and follow after him. That the inhabitants of the world preferred darkness to light earns them the name “children of darkness”. For this reason, Jesus refuses to pray for the world; instead, he defeats the world.

Contemporary Christians ought to heed the caution of the eminent Johannine scholar Raymond Brown, against the naiveté that this passage sometimes engenders. The world is not exclusively neutral, nor is it patiently awaiting good news. There are many who are actively hostile to Jesus, to Christianity and its message. Encountering the disbelief of the “world” was a shocking experience for the Johannine Christians. This knowledge should help their contemporary descendants to be forewarned and forearmed.

Today’s verses from the Gospel of John are selected from a more extensive discussion that Jesus had with Nicodemus, a Pharisee and “ruler” or “religious authority” among the Judeans of the house of Israel. He was attracted to Jesus, but approaching him at night suggests that Nicodemus was trying to hide his interest. But the discussion reported and interpreted by John runs in a circle because of Nicodemus’ apparent failure to understand Jesus. Nicodemus typifies many who came to Jesus: Some never understood him.

To his credit, though, Nicodemus seems to have pondered and perhaps even pursued his interest in Jesus further, no doubt in discussion with others in typically Mediterranean, group-centered fashion. Later in the Gospel, Jesus’ statements in the Temple prompt a divided response in his audience. Some believe in him, and others want to arrest him. The chief priests and Pharisees are disappointed and taunt and insult the Temple police for not arresting Jesus. At this moment, Nicodemus exposes himself to shame by defending Jesus’ right to a hearing. Shame is not long in coming: *Surely you are not also from Galilee, are you?* ask his fellow Pharisees derisively. Nicodemus the night visitor has now gone one step further, to daytime defender of Jesus, at least indirectly.

The final appearance of Nicodemus in John’s Gospel makes his spiritual journey appear to be complete. When Jesus dies, Nicodemus comes forward publicly with myrrh and aloes to anoint the body. He joins Joseph of Arimathea, a secret disciple of Jesus who feared the Judeans, and both of them see to the burial of Jesus’ corpse.

This final appearance of Nicodemus illustrates John 3:14: ***And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up that whoever believes in him may have eternal life;*** and, John 12:32: ***And when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw all people to myself.*** Lent is the opportune time to redirect one’s path to Jesus.

"ONE"CHANGE AT MASS ~ FROM THE USCCB COMMITTEE ON DIVINE WORSHIP

Taking effect on Ash Wednesday, if you tune your ear closely, you will now hear a slight difference in the words the priest prays at Mass. During the Collect - the opening prayer of Mass before the Liturgy of the Word - the priest concludes with "who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever" (emphasis added). The word "one" was included during an imperfect translation from Latin to English ("one" does not appear in the Latin text). Beginning Wednesday, "one" is omitted in order to maintain the truest possible translation and to best maintain Christological truth of the Holy Trinity.

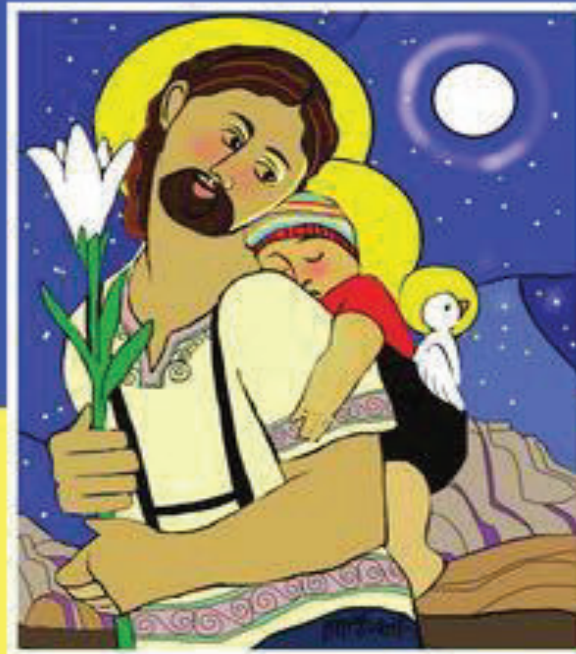

DIOCESAN ADVISORY

Guidelines for public, in-church Masses, as directed by the Diocese of Trenton:

1. COVID-19 is still extremely contagious, especially indoors or in closed settings;
2. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday/Holy Day Masses remains in effect so that all Catholic faithful, in good conscience, are not required to be physically present in church; live-streamed Masses will continue in most parishes;
3. Anyone who is sick or at risk should not come to church; that is not punitive but, rather, common sense and an act of charity toward your neighbors;
4. All parishes are expected to abide by occupancy and other regulations of the Diocese with care;
5. Masks must be worn (no exceptions), physical contact of any kind must be avoided, social distancing must be practiced, proper sanitation must be observed at all public, in church Masses;
6. Before attending public, in church Masses, the Catholic faithful are asked to consider any possible health and safety risks involved.

Weekend Masses-Directives & Guidelines

The Diocese has limited attendance at weekend Masses to 1/3 of attendance capacity. For Our Lady of Good Counsel this places us at approximately 220 people per Mass. However, in our pews with proper social distancing we are closer to 200. As our normal weekend Mass attendance, in normal circumstances is approximately 200 per mass, we will not place any restrictions on attendance at this time, but will revisit this if it is needed

- The Bishop continues to keep in place a dispensation from Sunday and Holy Day Obligations so that those who need to may “stay home in good conscience.”

Those in high risk categories should **strongly consider** staying home. Those with the symptoms of any respiratory illnesses **must** stay home.

- All who attend must either enter through the **Main front doors or through the elevator entrance**. The other doors will be locked. You may exit through any door.
- Seating will only be allowed in un-taped pews. Any non-cohabiting families must maintain social distancing of **at least 6 feet** even in the pews that are open. PLEASE RECOGNIZE THAT YOUR FAVORITE SEAT MAY NOT BE AVAILABLE.
- Facial masks or coverings must be worn by those who attend the Mass. The Priest and Lector will remove face coverings for the celebration but will wear them at all other times.
- For this initial phase, Holy Communion will be distributed at the end of Mass, not at the usual time. This will happen in both the front and rear of the Church. Please maintain distancing while in line and while exiting the Church. Remove your mask to receive communion and then replace your mask. **Communion in the Hand is strongly preferred at this time**. If you must receive on the tongue please try to wait until the end of the communion line.
- The Restroom in the Choir stairway is available for emergency use only.
- Hand hygiene should be maintained and while Sanitizer will be available at the doors of the Church, parishioners are encouraged to bring their own wipes and sanitizer as well.
- No bulletins, books, or handouts are allowed at this time. Holy Water fonts will be empty.
- There will be no Offertory procession. Collection baskets will be placed near the exits of the Church.
- Due to the danger of the spread of respiratory droplets: congregational singing is discouraged and hymns will not be announced.
- The continuation of public Masses will be contingent on volunteers willing to help sanitize the Church following the Masses.
- The Cry Room and the Sacristy are currently off limits to the public.
- The 10:30AM Mass will be live-streamed and recorded for the time being for those who stay home.
