## MARCH 19TH ~ THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

#### 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent

1 Sam 16:1b,6-7,10-13; Ps 23:1,3-6; Eph 5:8-14; Jn 9:1-41

One thing I do know is that I was blind and now I see. (Jn 9: 25b)

I wonder if we would recognize Christ if he appeared before us today. Would we embrace him and follow him in discipleship, or would we — tangled up in our web of interests, desires, and self-centered agendas — turn a blind eye to the living Word? Would we, like the Pharisees and others in Jesus' time, refuse to see the Lord in our midst?

The Pharisees were educated and regarded as leaders of Israel, with an intimate and confident knowledge of the Scriptures and the Law. They studied the words of Moses and the prophets, set themselves as arbiters of the law, and many delighted in standing before the masses as members of the elite and righteous interpreters of the word of God. Given their expertise and "wisdom," you would expect that they would have recognized the blind's man cure for what it was - still another confirmation of the nature and identity of Jesus.

Instead, like the self-righteous "experts" of our own day, the Pharisees, whether out of fear, insecurity, or malice, sought to discredit the healing of the blind man. Because the reality of Jesus posed a threat to the established order, the Pharisees (figuratively and literally) sought to demonize both the cured man and Jesus himself. Jesus, they asserted, was not from God. How could he be? His essence did not align with their beliefs and perceptions. The man, whose sight was restored in the waters of the Siloam replied in the wondrous simplicity of faith: Yet he opened my eyes!

Not only were the man's eyes opened in the waters of the pool, so too were his heart, mind and soul. The Lord's healing touch restored the man to fullness; the once-blind man opened his entire being to Jesus, enabling him to walk in the bright light of faith. The Pharisees, witnesses to the same reality, chose the blindness of denial and remained in darkness.

We have been washed in the waters of Baptism and have emerged with new eyes in the light of the risen Savior. Will we embrace the reality, or will we turn away from the light in fear? Let us follow the simple faith of the man born blind and recognize the glorious reality of Jesus Christ. It is our call to ongoing conversion: I do believe, Lord!

You were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. (Eph 5: 8)

Sunday, March 19th at the 10:30 Mass we will witness the Second Scrutiny.

From the first moment of Creation, when God spoke the word "Light" into the dark void, the Divine illumination has infused ultimate meaning into the visible universe. The account in St. John's Gospel of the gradual healing of the man born blind is proclaimed to the Elect, as they learn to accept the Light of divine meaning (Logos) into their lives.



Each of the sacraments has a visible sign that imparts invisible grace. What is seen with the natural eye is a mere shadow of the wonders of grace-made visible only to an eye enlightened by faith. Jesus takes the man who has been in natural darkness his whole life and places a mixture of saliva and clay onto those unseeing organs of sight. With the command "Go and wash" the Lord uses these outward signs and words to effect a miracle as the man experiences natural light for the first time.

The more significant miracle, however, is the gradual transformation of the man's spiritual sight. His faith is tested by the unbelieving religious authorities, who interrogate him, ridicule him, and eventually end up throwing the man out of their assembly. The Lord approaches him. At the moment of healing, this man saw Jesus physically, but now, after bearing the cross of social pressures, he sees Jesus's identity more clearly. "I do believe, Lord' and he worshipped him" (John 9:38). Calling him "Lord" (Kyrios in Greek), the man proclaims faith in the Son of God, the Word of Light who gives ultimate meaning to life.

We are invited to pray for our beloved Elect in a special way through this Scrutiny. Conscious of the constant struggle between Light and darkness, Mother Church teaches her Elect that the first stirrings of faith they experience will not be without a share already in the Cross; embracing faith means encountering misunderstanding, ridicule, and even being rejected. We pray for a renewal of that vision imparted to the man born blind, to be able to see the Divine meaning and purpose implanted in this visible universe and to reject the pull of the powers of Darkness into error, doubt, and unbelief.

Please keep our catechumen in your prayers as they continue to full communion at the Easter Vigil.



#### WHY DO WE VEIL THE CRUCIFIX AND STATUES DURING LENT?

Veils over sacred images keep our minds on the promise of Easter.

First, The Church uses Veils to alert us of the special time that we are in. When we walk into church and notice everything is covered, we immediately know that something is different. These last two weeks of Lent are meant to be a time of immediate preparation for the Sacred Triduum and these veils are a forceful reminder to get ready.

Second, veils focus our attention on the words being said at Mass. When we listen to the Passion narrative, our senses are allowed to focus on the striking words from the Gospel and truly enter into the scene. Third, the Church uses veils to produce a heightened sense of anticipation for Easter Sunday. This is further actualized when you attend daily Mass and see the veils each day. You don't want them to be there because they are hiding some very beautiful images. And therein lies the whole point: the veils are not meant to be there forever. The images need to be unveiled; it is unnatural for them to be covered. The unveiling before the Easter Vigil is a great reminder of our own life on earth. We live in a "veiled" world, in exile from our true home. It is only through our own death that the veil is lifted and we are finally able to see the beauty of everything in our lives. This Lent Our Lady of Good Counsel will be veiling the Crucifix and Statues. On March 25th, the Fifth Sunday of Lent. How are you doing on your Lenten Journey?
